Fine-motor movements involve the coordination of small muscles in the hands and fingers. Strong fine-motor skills are essential to complete tasks such as writing, cutting, using a fork, threading beads, buttoning, and tying shoe laces. In school, students use their fine-motor skills when they write and draw. Children who are more comfortable doing these things have more resources free to focus on classroom lessons. It is much easier to learn letters and numbers if one doesn't have to devote effort to the process of writing letters and numbers down. Without well developed fine motor skills, children may also have difficulty performing many of the other activities presented in the classroom. Moreover, fine motor skills are correlated with future academic achievement; children who present with fine-motor and visual-motor difficulties tend to struggle in academic subjects. In fact, finemotor difficulties have been widely documented in children

diagnosed with ADHD, Down Syndrome, Developmental Coordination Disorder and Autism.

This workshop will discuss fine-motor skills in early elementary school. A review of hand anatomy and stages of hand development will enable teachers to understand effective teaching practices. Strategies for promoting the development of fine-motor skills, including handwriting will be addressed.

The High School Redesign Project has now grown from 13 schools in 2009 to over 200 schools in the year 2017. Redesign schools across Alberta have worked diligently to implement the Foundational Principles of Redesign, many of which beginning with the adaptation of Flexible Scheduling to pursue greater personalization of student learning. Without doubt, all of these schools have experienced successes and drawbacks to this reform.

Seeking to inquire into the experiences of students within these redesign contexts, a study was conducted to explore the conditions and characteristics of the personalized reform initiatives within the three Alberta high schools. The results of this study, alongside relevant literature from similar personalized initiatives around the world, yield valuable conclusions about how Redesign impacts students success. Specifically, this study described how Redesign impacts students' relationships, academic success, and pursuit of goals.

The findings of this study will serve as realms of inquiry in a facilitated discussion about Redesign in practice. Teacher and leader participants of this session are asked to bring their varying experience with Redesign, from exploring entry, to experienced pilot project participant. The discussion will build upon the research presented to build capacity, and delve into a wider set of redesign experiences.

With recent announcements of gravitational wave detections from LIGO and Virgo, this session provides physics teachers with an authentic way to integrate these discoveries into their classroom. Participants set-up and use a table-top interferometer design to model how LIGO detects gravitational waves, and then investigate how scientists are able to infer information about the sources of these waves. Interactive vocabulary and grammar tools for teaching French

French Immersion

The purpose of my presentation will be to show teachers how to use a new, interactive vocabulary tool: BonPatron Xpress. This is a free, innovative approach to vocabulary learning that allows students to achieve a functional level in as few as 40 hour by focusing on: a) key vocabulary (around 500 words); b) pronunciation strategies; and c) basic grammatical concepts.

Vocabulary learning with BonPatron Xpess uses of interactive tables that allow students to move from comprehension to production. It also provides sound and exercises to make sure vocabulary is truly learned at a deep level. In addition, the tool provides a game that students can play in order to verify that the vocabulary they've aquired can be produced spontaneously (just like in conversation).

Analyzing Modern Media: Using Reader's/Writer's Methodology to Leverage Student Interests

We are teaching in an age of literary change.

People read newspapers online, they access library books through digital loan, sites like Spotify stream new music straight to their phones, people of all ages play video games with their friends without leaving the house, and millions use YouTube to watch music videos from the other side of the planet.

These new realities pose potential problems to teachers, who often lament that students no longer read and that they can no longer form their own opinions. These media, however, also offer opportunities to meet students where they are.

Consider that the average eighth grader plays video games for an average of five hours per week, and that by high school 77% of students have played (www.innovativelearning.com). Also consider that, in 2016 the global digital music industry grew by 7.8 billion USD (a 5% increase from the year before) and was driven largely by a 60% increase in digital streaming services (www.ifpi.org). In 2014, 95% of teens reported listening to an average of 31 hours of music every week (www.nielsen.com), and that most listen with their cellphones and tablets. Also, in 2014 digital comic sales topped 100 million dollar (up from 1 million from just seven years prior) and print comic book sales increased from 650 million in 2009 to 835 million USD (www.cnbc.com).

While it is not fair to say that all texts of these forms are intensely literary, the same can be same of traditional literature, but there are incredibly deep, immersive, and challenging themes being introduced and challenged in each of the forums.

We, as teachers interested in having our students think critically about the world the world, can leverage these texts and not only have them consider the media with which they are engaged, but we can also use it as a springboard for reading and writing.

This session will present potential ways to leverage Reader's/Writer's Workshop methodologies to have students analyse, consider, and describe art in all its forms, as well as to have them connect to the grand literary themes developed in our classical narratives (which should never be forgotten, ignored, or marginalised). It will simply explore ways to encourage students to think deeply about a world where critical thinking is becoming even more important.

The Enhanced Supports for Mental Health program is a unique divisional program created in response to more students identifying with elevated mental health needs and need additional supports above what is already facilitated in schools. This program housed at George McDougall High School in Airdrie currently serves 10 female students from across the division, including George McDougall High School. Students enrolled in the high school program are enrolled in 'regular' classes so that their academic needs are able to be supported locally. Staff in the program work with school staff to assist with academic goals, enhance staff awareness of working with students with mental health needs, as well as liaise with guidance and administrators on site.

The Enhanced Supports for Mental Health program provides a safe space for students and has built a close-knit community that the students regard as their home and family. The space is organic and based on the needs of each student and is flexible each day to respond to the lives of students. ESMH staff work closely with GMHS guidance and administrators to ensure that students have reduced barriers to their learning. School psychologists are also often in the space, meeting with students and working with GMHS staff to better understand mental health needs and programming is supplemented with experiential learning experiences including volunteering at a local foodbank, day trips to post-secondary institutions and art galleries, and equine therapy.

This panel presentation session will share the overarching philosophy of supporting mental health needs in schools as well as how the structure of the program works in practice including successes and challenges through perspectives of the teacher/counsellor, school psychologist, and administrator. Little Bull: How to Learn About and Address Racism through Creative Writing

Blair Yoxall will begin his session with a reading of his award-winning short story, "Little Bull." Narrated by six year-old Jaxon, "Little Bull" tells the story of a First Nations boy living in Lethbridge, Alberta as he revisits memories of cultural and familial connection with his grandmother, as well as the trauma of systemic and systematic racial prejudice as experienced by Indigenous people and Persons of Colour. "Little Bull" also illustrates the various ways in which systemic racism and inter-generational traumas manifest in the lives of Indigenous people, as well as the very real and chilling effects of verbal, systematic, and inter-personal racism as experienced through the eyes of a child and his grandmother. Through the first-person narrative schema used in "Little Bull," readers learn empathetically not only how racism exists in the lives of Indigenous people and Persons of Colour, but also how racism is indiscriminate of age and gender, instead intersecting and compounding with other social markers of identity.

Drawing on his own experiences as an unracialized author, Blair will discuss how he writes stories about people whose experiences are unique to them as racialized individuals. He will discuss the insular and ignorant qualities of his own privileges as far as his privileges insulate him from experiencing most forms of racial prejudice, thereby preventing him from developing real and experiential knowledge of race and racism. Consequently, Blair argues his privileges create an inequitably and unjustly elevated "ignorant knowledge bubble" wherein he is not necessarily required to understand race or racism from a victim's perspective for his own personal survival. Blair argues that he has a responsibility to pop his "ignorant knowledge bubble" internally by reaching out externally to others who have experiential knowledges of race, racism, and other forms of prejudice. Moreover, to prevent his "ignorant knowledge bubble" from re-inflating, he believes he must defer his knowledge to others who have experiential knowledge of race and racism. Lastly, he argues he has a responsibility to synthesize others' experiential knowledge theoretically, disseminate and regularly re-evaluate his knowledge, defer and refer his knowledge to those to whom he is indebted, and keep his "ignorant knowledge bubble" leveled by actively sharing his privilege.

Improving Oral Proficiency and Learner Confidence in French Immersion

French Immersion

In this presentation, I will address a fundamental problematic that we face in our French Immersion Programs. French Immersion Programs have been a very successful story all across the country for over 40 years now. Despite the immense popularity of the Program we are still faced with a fundamental dilemma. Our students basically achieve very

strong academic results in our schools. Most parents perceive that entry into the Program leads to a direct route to success. The irony surrounding this success is that it does not translate directly into learner confidence and learner proficiency in all of the expected skills in language acquisition and progression.

Typically our learners demonstrate strong comprehension abilities in reading and listening. Even when they perceive that the tasks were complex, they usually achieve strong results. When it comes to the productive skills this is where the gap is more evident. Our typical French Immersion student is still reluctant and scared to speak and interact. Despite the fact that they are exposed to significant hours in French most of them do not build the confidence to pursue the skills of interaction and production orally and in written form.

How do we transform this culture and this scenario? That will be the essence of this presentation. I will address major shifts that must happen within the learning environment:

The C Shift: moving from a content model to a competence model

The Q Shift: moving assessment from a quantitative model to a quality model based on criteria.

As this model of pedagogical shift is explained teachers will be exposed to a model where the teachers becomes an expert designer of Second Language Acquisition and Progression. The planning of the learning will focus on creating a balance within cycles where learners are exposed, acquiring and progressing in terms of interactions, productions and comprehension, orally and in written form. The common thread is that within the model oral proficiency and confidence is the central element.

In a very near future we are wanting to create a new prototype of French Immersion Learner. This learner will be very confident in speaking, oral interactions and oral comprehension. These three foundations will create a very skillful and confident French Immersion Student in th
