	we elect trustees and how they function after election. Using parties is likely to reduce the level of			
	engagement and information, as many voters will simply check the names associated with a party.			
	This would effectively eliminate the ability for thoughtful, non-affiliated trustees to be elected and			
	would entice divisive, party-focused campaigns that can often be driven by impulsive, emotional			
	campaigns on a small number of controversial wedge issues. After elections, trustees and boards			
	need to be focused on what is best for students. Introducing partisan politics into board meetings			
	will not be helpful. the following resolution will be presented at the 2024 ARA: "Be it resolved that			
	the Association opposes the use of political party affiliations in Alberta school board elections."
